

tigious awards in almost every major quilt show event in the Pacific Northwest Region. These events include the Association of Pacific Northwest Quilter's Quiltfest, Quilters Anonymous, Block Party, and the Busy Bees shows. In 2010, she received the honor of being selected as the Featured Artist for the Quilter's Anonymous



Needle and Thread Jim Jensen

Linda Hooper

Linda Hooper started sewing when she was five vears old. She was fascinated with the sewing machine that her mother never used, and when shown how it worked, started out making bean bags for herself and her sisters. It didn't take long for her to use her talents sewing her own clothes. Even though she didn't understand how they were made, Linda experienced an early love for guilts. Her first attempt at age 19 was a quilt made of a gauzy material. The results were disastrous; the quilt literally disintegrated.

When her kids were in kindergarten, the students were given an assignment to bring in a favorite piece of fabric from an old blanket or piece of clothing. The teacher asked the group if anybody knew of

someone who might be able to make a quilt out of the pieces. Of course, her kids volunteered Linda! It was another disaster because she used satin for sashing and the whole thing ended up being a mass of wrinkles (but no doubt beloved by the beneficiary).

In 2003 she discovered that quilting classes were being offered at Village Sewing Center. Never one to apany task halfproach heartedly. Linda showed up for her first class planning to make a "rails and fence" quilt from sparkly Asian fabric ... with four times the amount of fabric required



for a gueen size guilt. For her second project, she took a class in free motion guilting (FMQ). When told at the class that "you need 400 hours of practice" to be proficient with FMQ, she decided to make a king size guilt to practice on. The guilt was so large, she had to have everyone in the class help her with the basting. Well ... Linda entered that practice quilt at the Sonoma County Fair and won "Best of Class," the "Dory Whipple Award" for machine quilting, and "Best Use of Color" from the Moonlight Quilters of Sonoma County. As an award winner, she was invited to SRQG Founder's Day for lunch ... she had never considered joining a guild, but was hooked at her first meeting in 2005.

Amish guilts provided Linda with her first inspiration. She was drawn to the whole idea of the guilt: how it brings comfort; is a beautiful object of art; and with the use of bits of old clothing, becomes a memorial to family members long gone ... "quilting preserves our lives."

Linda enjoys all quilting methods, but piecing is her favorite. She's done some appliqué, but is not fond of fusing. She usually makes her own patterns rather than follow someone else's. Linda likes to let the fabric "tell" her what needs to be done with it. She wants the guilt to speak to her, and sometimes has used the seam ripper as much as the sewing machine. Linda always has 6 or more projects going on at a time, but ever one to finish what she starts, has only 4 or 5 UFO's and is committed to getting them done at some point.

She loves earth tones, gravitating particularly to red, green and gold. Every year she makes donation quilts; she has no problem giving the quilts away if they aren't in her favorite colors, but if they are, she ends up with "separation anxiety" and has to live with them for three or four weeks before she parts with them. So far she has kept 20 of the 40 or 50 guilts she has made over the years.

Like wine and good food can bring disparate people together, Linda appreciates the common bond of quilting that has brought us all together at the guild; people who might never otherwise have met or been friends. She loves all the noise and chatter during guild meetings, how we feed off and inspire each other and bounce ideas back and forth.

Starting out with hospitality in 2005, Linda was Vice President in 2007 and 2008, and President in 2009. Honorary Life Membership was bestowed in 2010. She has worked with Programs Elect and Programs: Linda has done wonders with our website, and is our videographer. Earlier this month she guided us through her second Mystery Quilt.

We're fortunate and grateful that Linda Hooper is so committed to the Santa Rosa Quilt Guild.

Barbara Youngblood Heart Made Quilts

Santa Rosa Quilt Guild's meeting on Thursday, June 5th, 2014 featured Affiliate Barbara Youngblood of 'Heart Made Quilts'. Barbara took the stage for 15 minutes and shared with us the business of guilting with her Gammill longarm. Barbara began quilting in 1976. She started her business in 2002 and introduced the Longarm in 2009. She notes that she has nine grandchildren - which is a prompt she uses to remind herself when she began quilting with the longarm. She said her quilts are sturdy, attractive, and inexpensive, referring to herself as "The Grandma Quilter". While on stage, she showed dozens of work sample patterns approximately the size of a placemat. Each one featured one of her many patterns, complete with back and batting. Barbara carries batting for her customers and sells it for a better price than many fabric stores. Barbara also displayed many of the quilts she has worked on over the years, delighting the group with each show-and-tell featuring her quilting. They were lovely and it was wonderful to see her heart-made work. Thank you, Barbara, for using your affiliate benefit to make a great presentation acquainting the guild with your business.

Diane Bare The Treasured Thread

Santa Rosa Quilt Guild is proud to announce that Affiliate Diane Bare, owner operator of 'The Treasured Thread', will be presenting her longarm quilting business Thursday, July 3^{rd,} 2014 at the guild business meeting.

Diane began sewing at the age of 7 years and has loved sewing ever since. In college she majored in Interior Design. Her sewing skills and creativity naturally fit this degree. Currently, Diane works full-time in San Francisco spending 15 hours a week commuting to and fro. She longs to be home and self-employed - thus began her longarm business two and a half years ago. She noticed as she went from quilt shop to quilt shop inquiring about the business of quilting how kind, friendly, and caring quilters are. She observed that they share information willingly and generously, noting that quilters are great people.

Her quilts have been shown as far away as Sisters, Oregon and as close as the Moonlight Quilters of Sonoma County's 'Wine Country Quilt Show.' She stocks batting for customer convenience and has an array of treasured threads. Diane primarily quilts with patterns but does some custom work from block to block on occasion. Her turn-around time is two weeks but has finished quilts in as little as one day. Diane also has a 6 needle embroidery machine to make custom labels. I think this makes 'The Treasured Thread' a cut above.

Diane will have quilting patterns and work samples available for viewing on July 3rd. You won't want to miss this affiliate presentation. Let's welcome Diane Bare of 'The Treasured Thread' with open arms when she takes the dais on July 3rd.

For June we are taking a bit of a break from our adventure in paper piecing.


"Patriot Heart" is an easily pieced 12" block consisting of half square triangles, squares and rectangles in red, white and blue.




