2016 Programs

JAN SOULES

October 20 & 21, 2016

Jan Soules has been quilting since 2000. She has never settled on one style, preferring to mix appliqué and pieced blocks using her sense of color and design to create her "treasures." Choosing colors and fabrics are her favorite part of the process and she carefully selects each piece in her so called "scrap" quilts. Her creativity continues to take her in different



directions. She has won many awards and had her quilts in AQS shows, PIQF, Road to California and the Hoffman Challenge traveling show.

She completed a course in judging and wearable art sponsored by the West Coast Quilt Judging Academy in 2012. Jan is a member of the Elk Grove and River City Quilt Guilds.

She is scheduled to be artist in residence at Empty Spools Seminar at Asilomar for session one in 2017.

October 20 Program

"Spectacular Borders, from Basics to Beyond"

This lecture includes a discussion of various border treatments, with emphasis on what works and why. She will use her prize winning quilts to demonstrate the different border treatments and explain how you can turn an ordinary quilt top into an extraordinary one!

"Kaleidosocope Quilt"
In this quilt you will make large colorful blocks from strip sets. You will learn how to make a template. There is no matching of seams required so you can be free to create your own unique work of art. Each quilt will be individual and unique treasure.



The pattern can be adapted to any size quilt. You can stick with a color theme or use a variety of colors and patterns. It is your creation so gather your fabrics and have some fun. This one is a great scrap buster!


TSWs are free to attend! We assemble after lunch near the stage. Sign ups & information will be in the back of the room under TSW sign. We will distribute handouts at the TSW.





Quiltathon!

October 6th is our last Quiltathon of the year. Doors open at 9:00 am, and you can sew from 9:00 to 10:00 when we'll break for a short business meeting. Then back to sewing until about 2:30 pm. We look forward to spending the day with you and to putting all of your generosity and creativity to work.

If you are making donation quilts on your own, these are the approximate sizes most needed.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter & Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, & teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other Organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults. Given to Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convalescent hospitals, & others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls & boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.

Lake Tahoe Retreat

Blessed are the Piecemakers Zephyr Point, Lake Tahoe August, 2016

Early Sunday morning on a beautiful day Phyllis G., Linda T., and I head over the mountains and through the woods stopping only to lunch at 'Fats in Folsom' and procure fabric at a well-loved Placerville fabric shop called 'High Sierra.' We were on a tight clock but lingered at Fats long enough to thoroughly enjoy this twice a year treat, then discovered there was some traffic heading East on 50 - and it was gobbling up valuable shopping time! So we tooled through town instead of getting off at the appropriate exit further up the road. Once there (with only fifteen minutes to spare) we dash in to do a quick circle around the aisles of materials – then notice a line at the cutting table several people deep. We don't have that kind of time! I suggest we try again on the way home when Genelle V. offers to stand at the cutting table in our stead, allowing us to continue our journey. We arrive at Zephyr Point within a few minutes of the goal. (Thank you, Genelle.)

We check in, get keys and supplies, and begin to set -up. While Linda T. and my Lady P. ready Echo Peak (our sewing room), I am "Mistress of the Keys" and dole out the rooms lottery fashion by asking each arriving quilter to reach into a sack and pull out the numbered key which will designate their room. Sitting outside the sewing room I noticed the air was humid and in the sky, puffy dark clouds forming just above us. Then the thunder began. I think there is a prayer for this that goes something like, "Please do not let the electricity go off. Please, please, please!" The wind whipped the waves into white caps.

Echo Peak was ready to receive twenty-two of us in record time. The sewing machines were powered up and the ladies got started. We received gift bags as a treat. This time, the bag itself is one of the treats along with machine needles, straight pins, paper, and Post It notes. (I neglected to bring needles so this gift was excellent for me.) There were many fun projects and amazing materials and much laughter. Before I knew it, dinner was ready.

The lodgings come with food. There are cafeteria style lines, tables, and do it yourself salad and beverage bars at 8am, 12 noon, and 6pm daily. This frees the quilter to remain focused on creating. The food is plentiful and, mostly, not bad. Since I was on

vacation I treated myself to candy-coated coffee, apple turnovers, apple crisp, and a divine coconut macaroon partially dipped in chocolate. (I also hadpancakes, waffles, French toast, biscuits and gravy, sausage, bacon, sausage patties, rib eye steak, meatloaf, Chicken Cordon Bleu, ham, turkey dinner, sandwiches, and hamburgers. Not all at once, of course.) After dinner we waddled to our rooms at our leisure. Between the wind in the trees and the waves crashing hard on the shores it sounded as if we were on any Sonoma County beach. (This is just one of the ways the lake behaves at night...)

The lake is calm in the mornings. A few water enthusiasts dot the lake. Darling rabbits, squirrels, and chipmunks feed on the grasses and trees while blue jays squawk and screech at the invaders on their turf. It sounds oddly like politics to me. Breakfast is waiting and it doesn't wait long. (One hour. Don't be late.) Clouds are building overhead and the air feels moist again. The goal I set for myself is to start with something hard, then do something fun. The hard thing is to complete 40 8-inch crazy quilt blocks of silk ties on foundation. Then I can reward myself with my cat friendship blocks. It turns out, 40 blocks is more ambitious than time will allow. By the time I get 15 or so finished, I update my vision. So that I don't go crazy, I decide the blocks don't all have to be crazy, either. I can take the foundation fabric and put a full 8.5-inch piece of sueded silk in gray and then topstitch the quilting lines - which gives continuity to the crazy quilt effect while offering the eyes rest. The quilt top is improved and I get to my fun project sooner.

Toni offers to help me put the cat blocks on the design wall. After two-dozen trips up and down a footstool, I approve a design and begin to sew the blocks together. The piece bends to my will and I like it more and more. The borders go on and I notice one of them is wavy. Rats! I still have work to do. I ask Phyllis for help and Pam B. her opinion. Judith C. and Raychell share tips, tricks, and techniques. By late afternoon there is lightning and thunder. The "Quilters Prayer for Electricity" is invoked. Fortunately, the seam ripper is my friend and so is the iron. Most of the group goes into town for dinner and to maybe catch a show. Several of us stay on-site and I learn something about the secret life of fabric. My cat quilt is square! I can hardly believe it.

Evidently, measuring is important if one wants a square, flat quilt...

The Most Fun Job in the World!

When I first joined the guild I was in awe of the wonderful speakers and the knowledge of the members! Who knew those speakers and how did they decide to come to our guild? These were important and big named people! I could never be Program and Workshop Chair Elect because I didn't know ANYONE in the quilt world! However, this is one of the best and most fun jobs in the guild and its okay if you don't know named quilters!

So why should someone consider this position? This is a position designed for two people. You will get a "pink binder" which is a step by step guide on directing you through the position. By attending Northern California Quilt Council (NCQC) in January and June you will be able to meet and talk with a variety of quilters; traditional, modern, art, etc. You will be able to determine which quilters you would like to hire within your budget. Contracts are sent out and returned, the calendar is filled and the job of Programs and Workshops Elect is just about completed for the year. Yes, you can hire other quilters who are not part of NCQC.

So when does the real fun begin? It begins the next year when the speakers present! Speakers can be housed by anyone in the guild including you! You don't need a big house. All a hostess needs is a private bedroom and of course a bathroom they can use! Some don't mind pets. Going out for dinner is an option, if the hostess doesn't like to cook. The guild will reimburse the cost of the speaker's meals but not the hostess' meals. Sometimes the speaker would like to see the area, visit stores or just go back to the house and relax. There is no rule for speaker entertainment! Anyone hosting a speaker will receive a voucher for a free workshop valid for one year from the date you hosted the speaker! A sweet PERK!

Throughout the year you would be responsible for talking about lectures and workshops, collecting workshop fees, and sending articles to the newsletter about the speaker. Most speakers send a biography, lecture, and workshop information and a sample of their work to you! On lecture and workshop days you will need to help the speaker set up and clean up. Workshop participants so often help before and after class! Just think you get to go to all of the workshops! That is a big PERK!

Throughout the year you will meet some of the nicest people who will often share techniques and ideas with you. In 2017 I will begin my third term as Program Chair Elect! That means I will have been fortunate enough to have been able to become better acquainted with 30 wonderful, talented quilters!
