President's Message

Beth's Quilt Club is the inspiration of Dr. James Foley in honor of his dear wife Beth, who was a long-time cherished member of Santa Rosa Quilt Guild and the Pointless Sisters. Dr. Foley chose to use the passing of his beloved companion as a positive outreach to the community by offering the students at Roseland University Preparatory High School an afternoon program that would give them the opportunity to learn how to sew.

He reached out to Beth's friends at SRQG to realize his vision. Genelle Voorhees eagerly offered to meet with Dr. Foley and took the lead in the creation of **Beth's Quilt Club**.

Genelle's dedication and organizational skills shone brightly. With the first meeting scheduled for early in October. Genelle and her team of volunteers were fingerprinted and given the required TB test. She approached John Furtado, owner and operator of Village Sewing Center in Santa Rosa, for assistance. John happily donated four sewing machines to the school for the Club's use and offered to service the machines as needed. The machines will be kept in storage at the school so they can be used again next year. With other donations, six machines were available for the students to use for the entire class. Fabric. thread. scissors, cutters, and all the essential supplies were gathered from personal stashes and

community donations. Jessica Mullins-Thomas, a school advisor, offered to chaperone the weekly club meetings. Dr. Foley was always present, eagerly helping to set up and tear down the room for each meeting. Volunteers were purple t-shirts emblazed with "Beth's Quilt Club."

Besides Genelle, we are grateful for the other volunteers: Angie Frey, Lorna Fiori, Diana Watson, Jeanne Parent, Jan Nilsen, Laura Barrett, Rhonda Denny, Vicki David, and Elizabeth Marrs.

The Club was scheduled to meet every Thursday from 3:30 to 5:30, starting on October 6, 2016. The first meeting in the art room greeted the students with sewing machines on the tables and fabric and other supplies laid out nearby. Starting out with five enthusiastic students, the Club was able to provide a one-one tutelage. They covered their notebooks with fabric and learned how to make pillowcases, table runners, tote bags, and kaleidoscope blocks. More importantly, they learned sewing terminology, techniques, and how to sew on different machines.

At the end of the school year, Jasmine (pictured with her kaleidoscope blocks), Bmo, Rosalia (pictured with Genelle), Oxmar and Gio (all pictured with Dr. Foley, Diana Watson and Jessica Mullins-Thomas) were celebrated for their enthusiasm and curiosity with an all-day retreat on May 13, 2017. Each student was given their own sewing machine to take home with them. Thanks to Rhonda Denny, Sharon Fry, Judy Dieter, and Genelle Voorhees for their generous donation of machines for the students. Tables were laid out with yards and yards of fabric for them to rummage through and take as much as they liked. They were also given a basket filled with supplies. Since many of the students were sophomores last year, most plan to return next year to learn even more. Even though there may be returning students, there will still be room in the classes for younger students to begin and continue the learning process.

Genelle shares, "I loved every minute of BQC, from planning to making it a reality. The students are so upbeat and appreciative, and my volunteers and support team are the best! It has been a wonderful experience and I'm looking forward to the next school year."

Rhonda happily wrote of one of the students,

"Rosalia wound two bobbins and threaded her new Viking. She tested different stitches, including embroidery, and made stitch length changes. We briefly went through the manual. Her smile and excitement made me applaud her success and encourage her by saying, 'You're sewing with the big girls now.' She was joyful and said, 'Now I can sew through the summer!' I gave her my number and told her to feel free to call."

June 15 Program

"Landscapes"

Laura has been a mural painter and seamstress for

many years, and has recently begun to combine the two media and go in a whole new direction — art quilting. She uses a "painterly" collage style in her art, with landscapes as her primary focus. Much of her inspiration comes from the beauty she enjoys on a daily basis in Mendocino County.



Laura's work has been shown both locally and nationally. Many pieces have been juried into major shows, and a number have been prizewinners. Her work has been published in calendars, magazines, and books. She lectures and teaches art quilting classes throughout Northern California. For the last 30 years, Laura has been teaching blind people how to get around with a white cane. Maybe it is this all-day focus on lack of sight that makes the world such a visual treat for her. Everything in her landscapes is cut freehand and allowed to move around as she machine appliqués pieces onto the layers below. She works fast as a means of achieving a more dynamic outcome.

June 16 Workshop

"Quilted Landscape Collage"

Laura Fogg's workshop on Friday, June 16, 2017 will help you discover the "artist within" as you play with the fabrics of your choice to create a small (2' by 3')

landscape collage wall quilt. Expect this to be a fun, creative, interactive and successful experience. Each student will start with a photo of a place that inspires them (possibly a scene from Emandal) and create a freehand collage quilt which can be sewn together in or out of class by hand or with



a sewing machine. There are no patterns or rules in this class...it's a chance to play and explore your unique artistic eye with the support of both the instructor and your classmates. Her workshop is designed for all levels of quilters!

APRIL SPROULE July 20 & 21, 2017

July 20 Program

"Transition From Technician to Artist"

Join us on July 20th to learn about April Sproule. April is an artist whose medium is textiles. She has a great love of design and the ways that it can be used to enrich and embellish our lives. Initially trained in fashion design, she eventually began creating artwork with the skills she had mastered. In recent years, she has



been developing a collection of reproducible designs for the purpose of creating layered imagery and engineered prints for fiber art and mixed media applications. She has been a full time studio artist for the past twenty years.

April stated, "Creating art allows me total freedom: the freedom to be optimistic about the outcome of my work as I am flooded with fresh ideas and insights. There are no boundaries or limitations, and every challenge presents an opportunity for me to find a new solution."

In her lecture, April will discuss how she evolved over the years from an entirely left-brained analytical perfectionist in her art work to a person who has learned to work in an entirely different manner. Now able to work from her heart with an uninhibited and enlightened outlook, she will share valuable tips on how to find your own creative voice and work through those bothersome creative blocks that we all encounter. She will share many of her quilts and fiber art pieces and reflect on how monumental the pieces were in her artistic development and transformation.

July 21 Workshop

"Fabric Painting With Stencils"

July's workshop will be Fabric Painting with Stencils conducted by April Sproule.

Stencils have been around for centuries, and they remain one of the easiest and most effective ways to apply imagery to fabrics. In class, we will be using a unique collection of stencils April has developed that are incredibly simple to use. The Textile Design Stencils are perfectly suited for a wide variety of fiber art applications such as quilting projects, wearable art, and home décor.

The paints are water-based and completely washable.


Community Quilts

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter & Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, & teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other Organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults. Given to Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convalescent hospitals, & others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls & boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.

Friendship Blocks



Just one more step into the age of technology.


Sew-A-Row




Sewing Room Sale July 6, 2017
