President's Message

One of the tricks we all learn as quilters is when to step away.

Yesterday I was sewing the binding to the back of a large quilt that I've been working on for years. I have only one side left to complete it. I patiently threaded my needle, gave the thread a good coat of "Thread Heaven," tied a quilter's knot at the end, and completed my first stitch. So far, so good. On to the next stitch, pulled the thread through and instantly created three loopy knots. I tried to unknot it to no

avail, got my scissors to cut the culprit, and started over. Not enough thread to justify using what's left, so I got the spool, cut another piece, and repeated steps one through four. As I made my second stitch, I pulled the thread through and created two loopy knots this time. Okay. The universe is telling me I should be doing something else, so I put the project away and went out to the garage to continue with the laundry.

This has happened to me while sewing on my machine, too. Starting a new project, the bobbin case is cleaned, new bobbin, new needle, carefully thread the machine. I can tell by the first few stitches something's not right. Cut the thread, major bird's nest on the back. Reset the bobbin, rethread the machine, try it again, and I'm making a new home for our neighborhood hummingbird.

I'm sure I'm not the only one. There are times when you just need to take a deep breath and step away for a while ... change your focus ... perhaps see it as another lesson in having patience (how many times do we need that message?).

Step away for a while ... a good skill to use dealing with life in general these days. I've stepped away from watching the news; I've stepped away from reading the newspaper (and skip by most news posts on the internet). I admire that some people can stay immersed in the craziness, but for me, I treasure my sanity. I'm not advocating turning a blind eye or trying to ignore what's happening. I vote; I write my congress people. But more im-

portantly, I always try to be kind and to help spontaneously. For me, acting locally is the most effective way to create change.

I am grateful for the Santa Rosa Quilt Guild being a safe haven in the storm. No matter how we view the direction the country is taking, we can meet together with our love for the art and craft of quilting, and step away from the disagreements and madness, even if for a few hours. It is through the sharing of our talents with the community that we are all creating change.

October 19 Program

"Five Inch is a Cinch"

Pat Speth began quilting in 1988 when she purchased a wool quilt batting from her Grandmother's auction. "I checked out a stack of quilt books from the library and fell in love with the patterns and designs; I knew I could not stop with just one quilt."



Pat started working with 5 inch squares as a basis for her quilt making in 1993 after attending her first retreat. She was

asked to do a program for her guild in 1997 using the 5" squares, which gave her the push to explore new uses and techniques for working with the squares. Pat, while working a full time job, started on the book, *Nickel Quilts* in 1998 and was able to have it ready for the publishers in June 2001.

She loves teaching the methods for working with the 5" squares, and sharing her quilts with others. After juggling her full time job and her quilting for many years, Pat moved into a full time quilting career in July 2003. "I have found my passion in life, and I can't imagine doing anything else."

When she is not quilting (a rare and odd occurrence) Pat enjoys traveling with her two webmasters and children, Ray and Roxie, who keep her from getting lost in foreign lands. She lives in St. Paul, Minnesota. Her lecture is entitled "Five Inch is a Cinch--How Nickel Quilts Are Created" –This trunk show is sure to get quilters fired up about using 5" squares of fabric. Pat will bring a great assortment of quilts from her collection. You will learn to focus on the blocks in the quilts and the simple components from which they are made.
