

Mark your calendars April 19th for guest speaker and teacher Lorraine Olsen, Miniature Quilt Artist and author. She will be making the journey to California from Missouri. Lorraine's lecture is "My Passion for Miniature Quilts." Her book, "Little Lone Star Quilts" introduces small versions of classic patterns. She loves using reproduction fabric, her own hand dyes,

and batiks. She will have merchandise featuring her books, thread, and hand-dyed fabrics and socks.

Lorraine says, "Coming from a heritage of master craftswomen, I learned sewing, quilting and needlework skills from my mother and grandmothers. I got my first sewing machine on my 8th birthday to keep me from monopolizing my mom's.

"After my third child was born, I became very ill and it was difficult for me to sew. I discovered miniature quilts and their small scale was perfect for me. My illness has taught me patience and perseverance. That alone with a streak of perfectionism is the perfect combination for a miniature quilt maker.

"I love vintage quilts and reproduction fabrics. In much of my work I try to capture the look of a vintage quilt made from saved scraps of past projects and faded old clothes only much, much smaller."

Sew-A-Row

What is a Sew-A-Row (SAR)? It's a quilt in the making!

Beginning each January, any Guild member can prepare a starting row or medallion and turn it over to the SAR Team. The SAR Team puts each starting row or medallion up for adoption to anyone in the Guild who wants to put their creative stamp on it, taking into consideration the original colors and design. As each person turns in their row, they are asked to include fabric scraps for the next person to incorporate into the next and subsequent rows. Near the end of the year, several members have added love to the rows, and a nice quilt top has been created. At the meeting in December there is a rolling of the dice to determine which lucky participant gets to take the quilt top home.

Well, come and learn how it is done. Janet will show you her technique for fearless "Y" seams! Here is a sample of one of her beautiful quilts.



Tips and Tricks from Guild Members

We have a great line up for 2018 so I hope all of you will attend at least some of these short workshops. We are lucky to have a wealth of talent in our guild.





Liz Berg Workshop

Liz was a teacher for the Pointless Sisters about 10 years ago. When this year's slate of teachers was released, the feedback for Liz was enthusiastic and positive. This gave me comfort for the success of the workshop - and it was a success indeed.

Loni picked me up at 7:40. We arrived at 8 o'clock on the dot. Phyllis and Becky were already inside the building, ready to set up the classroom for the workshop. SRQG workshops are held at the Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center located at 2050 Yulupa Ave. Upon arrival, the building was an icebox but it didn't take long to heat up.

The color study was plentiful in handouts and color samples, probably thousands of 6x6" fabric squares supplied by classmates and teacher. I brought my knitting because I thought I knew what I wanted to know about color and I like my work so I thought I'd knit once the class got started. My knitting never came out of my bag. The first page of the handout is on definitions. Each definition is highlighted in specific color - which drew me in. Maybe I did have something to learn...

Hue is the name of the pure color, i.e., red, yellow, or blue

Value is the degree of light or dark between the extremes of a hue.

Intensity is the pure hue to a grayed hue, i.e., bright to dull.

Temperature refers to warm or cool colors.

Tint is when white is added to the hue.

Shade is when black added to hue. ('Draw the shade and the room darkens.' Credit to Ellindale for this great memory tip.)

Tone is a grayed hue.

I totally get color now. The worksheets that followed were excellent reinforcement. I am going to laminate mine for reference. (Plus, they are very pretty, in my humble opinion.) They took us through a 12-color Color Wheel. Another worksheet uses the rainbow and adds to each pure color tint, shade, and tone. Other exercises looked at Split Compliments, Triadics, and Complementary Color.

The last 30 minutes of the workshop were used for the last two worksheets. These were probably the most intense because one is a 24-color Color Wheel and an alternative 12-color wheel using magenta, yellow, and cyan instead of red, yellow, and blue.

The February BOM is "F is for Flying Geese". The Flying Geese pattern is constructed using squares and rectangles which personally, is easier than sewing with triangles. And of course, the colors are any shade of purple along with contrasting colors. The directions are on our website:

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

Community Quilts

QUILTATHON! This Thursday, February 1st is our first Quiltathon of the year. Please join us as we finish guilts for children at Valley of the Moon, babies in the NICUs at Memorial and Sutter Hospitals, and other deserving community members. Laura Barrett and Nancy Stedman will oversee the day and need people to do all sorts of quilting tasks. Please bring your machine to sew layered quilts or to quilt the VOM or baby guilts. Remember to bring a pillow to sit on, walking foot, free motion foot, and a neutral thread. If you like to do hand sewing, bring your own little sewing kit, complete with thimble, small sharp scissors, and needles. We will also have some standing jobs - ironing, pinning the layered quilts (no special tools needed), and trimming and turning the layered and sewn quilts (bring a large pair of sharp scissors). Doors open at 9:00 am, and you can sew from 9:00 to 10:00 when we'll break for a short business meeting. Then back to sewing and visiting with friends until about 2:30 pm. At noon our wonderful hospitality crew will serve several delicious soups to accompany salads and desserts brought by members. This past year we donated 1,237 quilts to the community. This includes the 501 that Lavella and her mini group make for veterans. We have also donated many quilts to fire survivors.
