President's Message

Another disruption of my quilting time ... I must confess I have really been enjoying the Winter Olympics. It's truly inspiring to watch these young athletes excel at their sport and realize their life-long dreams. Even more inspirational, especially in these times, is to witness the congregation of all countries, ethnicities, religions, genders, and colors without the distraction of politics or the distortion of societal judgement. The Games set the ultimate example of how the rest of the world should be conducting itself. Be the best you can be at what you love to do and don't pass judgement or try to force your interpretation of how "life is supposed to be" on your fellow human.

And that got me to thinking (which can be scary sometimes): we should introduce the "Winter SEW-lympics."

Here are some "games" in which any of us might excel!

"Bob(-bin) Sled Ride" – a four person team must build a sled out of plastic bobbins big enough to accommodate two people. When the sled is completed, they must be able to push it across the stage. Each member of the team that figures out how to get the bobbins to stay together and cross the stage in the shortest time (with the loss of the fewest bobbins) wins a fat quarter.

"Giant Slalom (Skiing) Stitch" – individuals compete in figuring out how to sew the largest wavy stitch on their sewing machine. Use of free motion quilting is an automatic disqualification. Winner gets a spool of Aurifil thread.

"Ironing (Skate) Board" – A team sport – one person must starch and iron 4 yards of fabric, one person hangs the fabric so it does not get creases in it, one person turns the ironing board upside down, climbs aboard, and with the fabric flying behind, is pushed by the other members of the team down the hallway at the Scottish Rite. Team that has the best time (as in laughing hysterically) gets to keep the fabric.

"Freestyle (Skating) Quilting" – each of six team members select one unfinished quilt from Community Quilts. The first team to turn in all six completed quilts receives another six to quilt.

"Cross Country (Skiing) Quilt Shows" – from Paducah to Houston to PIQF, teams of four traverse the country with the intention of visiting as many quilt shows as possible in the interim. The competition lasts for the year of 2019. First team home with the most shows visited and without fallen arches or knee braces wins a year of staying home to process all the fabric they purchased.

"Curling (your hair)" – individuals are blindfolded and set up at sewing machines that have not been tuned for three years. They must thread the machine and sew a piece of denim to a piece of silk with a perfect ¼" seam. The last one to scream out enough expletives to "curl your hair" wins three days of fabric therapy at Robert Kaufman's, all expenses paid.

We could invite the Moonlight Quilters and Petaluma Quilt Guild to join us in the competition. Maybe add it to our Tri-Guild luncheon next year.

Or maybe it's just better to send your president to Tahiti for a long needed rest!

On a totally different note – as we approach St. Paddy's Day, my wish for you ...

May there always be work for your hands to do;

May your purse always hold a coin or two;

May the sun always shine on your windowpane;

May a rainbow be certain to follow each rain;

May the hand of a friend always be near you;

May your heart be filled with gladness to cheer you.




Programs & Workshops

Mark your calendars April 19th for guest speaker and teacher Lorraine Olsen, Miniature Quilt Artist and author. She will be making the journey to California from Missouri. Lorraine's lecture is "My Passion for Miniature Quilts." Her book, "Little Lone Star Quilts" introduces small versions of classic patterns. She loves using reproduction fabric, her own hand dyes, and batiks. She will have merchandise featuring her books, thread, and hand-dyed fabrics and socks.

Lorraine says, "Coming from a heritage of master craftswomen, I learned sewing, quilting and needle-





ance. That alone with a streak of perfectionism is the perfect combination for a miniature quilt maker.

"I love vintage quilts and reproduction fabrics. In much of my work I try to capture the look of a vintage quilt made from saved scraps of past projects and faded old clothes only much, much smaller."

Lorraine's workshop on April 20th at the Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center at 2050 Yulupa Ave. will host up to 25 students. There is a pattern fee of \$5.00 for 12-miniature, paper pieced, three inchsized blocks. Remember, when enrolling in a SRQG workshop a payment must be present to hold your seat. SRQG workshops are a mere \$40.00, which is a steal for the caliber of teachers and artist we feature. If paying with cash, please see me for a receipt. Workshops begin promptly at 9:00 a.m. Bring a sack lunch for the 30-minute lunch break. Class ends at 3:30 and the doors are locked at 4:00 p.m.



GO! Die #55029 – HEARTS (2, 3, and 4") –an extra die for our collection, donated by Mary Ann Hayre.

GO! Die #55365 – HALLOWEEN CAT (5 x 7") and BAT (5 x 3") – an extra die for our collection, donated by Mary Ann Hayre.

Welcome Committee

Santa Rosa Quilt Guild wants you to know that we have a Welcome Committee to assist with guests and new members. The Welcome Committee is staffed with mentors to guide newcomers around the room explaining each of our activity stations and make introductions to committee members.

SRQG meets on the first and third Thursdays of most months. The first meeting is a Business Meeting, when quilt-related announcements and committee reports are made followed by Show and Tell, a light buffet-style lunch (meant to supplement the sandwich you bring), Silent Auctions, and Boutique raffles.

Meetings begin promptly at 10:00am. The doors to the Scottish Rite Center on the corner of Acacia Lane and Highway 12 open at 9:30 am. Parking is limited so we recommend ride sharing and/or an early arrival. The doors close at 3:00 pm. Each meeting runs about two hours but there is plenty to do after the meeting.

The second meeting of each month is the Program Meeting where we feature a guest speaker and teacher. Workshops are held the third Friday of most months at the Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center 2050 Yulupa Ave. Workshops begin at 9:00 am sharp and end at 3:30 pm. There is a 30 minute lunch break and a 30 minute group clean up. The doors lock at 4:00. Workshops cost \$40.00. There may or may not be an additional pattern or kit fee, depending upon the workshop.

Membership in the SRQG is \$35.00 a year, which is a steal of a deal. For this, one may participate in Block of the Month, Friendship Blocks, Community Quilts, Sew-a-Row, Quilt-a-Thons, Technique Sharing Workshops, Boutique, Programs and Workshops (additional fees apply), as well as a world-class Library featuring over 3000 books, die cutters, rulers, stencils, dvds, patterns, and more. There are two luncheons a year; Founders Day in September (41 years strong) and a Holiday Luncheon in December. If you have any questions or concerns please feel free to email me or call. I do screen my calls so please leave a message.

Do you need a ride? Call me two days before you need the ride, if possible, and I will query the membership in your neighborhood to assist.



32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter & Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, & teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other Organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults. Given to Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convalescent hospitals, & others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls & boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.
