Of all the board positions that make SRQG run smoothly, the "behind-the-scenes" role with the most responsibility is that of vice president. The VP is liaison with the front office at the Scottish Rite. They keep track of the schedule, and assure that the room is set up in the proper configuration whether it is for business meet-

ings, speaker meetings, Quiltathons, or special events. The VP is also responsible for setting up and taking down the sound system, helping the setup for visiting opportunity quilts, and generally making sure the room is free of hazards. It is often necessary for them to physically rearrange the tables or chairs to be sure the room flows well. The VP sits beside the president during board meetings, and runs the meetings when the president is not available. You are not likely to hear them make any VP report on stage. They provide a quiet strength that is so essential to conducting our meetings as the inspiring events they are.

How very fortunate we are to have Jan Nilsen as our vice president this year!

Jan developed her exceptional organizational skills during her 45 years in the nursing profession, from caring for patients in the ICU, to teaching, to providing therapy for those in crisis. When her boss at Kaiser retired, a group of her co-workers made quilt blocks as a remembrance and because she was the only one of the group that could sew, Jan made her first quilt.

She grew up with an aunt who was an excellent seamstress. Jan learned how to knit and make clothes, but school got in the way of her pursuing fiber arts as a hobby for a while. From those lessons by her aunt, she developed a great love of knitting and over the years has taken many workshops, some a week long.

Many artists like David Taylor and Rosalee Dace have inspired Jan, but she also gets inspiration more locally from the Pointless Sisters and other members of SRQG. Although she has pieced many

bed-sized quilts, her current passion is for fused appliqué. She prefers to create her own designs rather than follow someone else's pattern, so raw edge appliqué is very well suited to Jan's artistic bent. Her philosophy is "It doesn't really matter what you're working on as long as it brings out the artist in you and you find your personal voice."

She enjoys going to many workshops and retreats, especially Bishop's Ranch. Although Jan appreciates the short workshops we offer at the guild, she really prefers the intensive workshops that take a week or so to really get into a project and finish it.

Therefore, it's no surprise that she has very few UFOs - currently maybe four. Jan doesn't like things sitting around and is prone to finish something when she gets started. If her space is all cluttered, she says she can't think clearly. Jan tends to keep most of her creations and often changes out the displays at home.

Jan loves the guild for how involved everyone is in such a variety of activities. After being in the guild for five years, it feels like family. She likes how people take care of each other even outside of guild activities. Jan is inspired by the variety of work and is amazed at what she sees during Show-and-Tell. Quilting is not a competition. Everyone celebrates each other's creation, whether a beginner or a more experienced stitcher. That acknowledgement that quilting is not a competition explains why she doesn't put entries in the juried shows like the coun-

As one of the primary members teaching students to quilt at Beth's Sewing Club at Roseville Prep, she wishes that people would get more involved with teaching sewing to the younger generations. In today's device-driven world, sewing could become a lost art. Jan feels getting people involved in quilting has become one of her best achievements. She is really enjoying making art quilts and finds herself moving toward more abstract designs. Jan has gotten away from taking on a challenge just to do it. She likes to get into a project and let the quilt tell her where it wants to go. That's her real artistic zone.

Outside of her quilting world, Jan is a real car buff and has a special interest in electric cars. She can often be found reading up on what's happening with fuel efficiency and advances in the industry. And, of course, she loves spending time with her Maine Coon kitties and hanging out with them in the garden.

We are so fortunate that Jan Nilsen has volunteered to be our vice president.

"Quilt-a-Beast" is the title of the lecture that will be presented by Jane Tenorio Coscorelli on June 20. Jane is a free-lance artist who has combined her artistic talent and love of quilting to create "1/4 Inch Publishing." For the past thirteen years she has successfully designed and produced her product line of books, patterns, fabrics, and notions.

She is a renowned author, artist, and quilter whose talents have been featured in the Steven Spielberg movie "How to Make an American Quilt," Vista Quilts, and on Simply Quilts. Jane has taught across the country educating adults and children through sharing her stories. Jane has been a staple at literacy conventions, ethnic festivals, and national quilt shows. In 2005 she joined a creative team of studio designers to create fabric lines that represent her Latin heritage. With her vibrant choice of colors, patterns, and texture designs she hopes to inspire the quilter in all of us.

The workshop on Friday, June 21 is "Altar Quilt - Day of the Dead". Learn what the Day of the Dead celebration is about using fabric. You will build your own Altar quilt and embellish it with the memories of those you love. The pattern will be provided. The workshop will be held at the Village Sewing Center.

Living a Creative Life with Jane Haworth

During her August 15 lecture/trunk show, Jane Haworth will discuss the influences that have made her the quilt maker she is today. She will share some of her favorite techniques with us. Jane will talk about setting up an Etsy shop and how she



uses this for her T-shirt quilt business. She will also describe some of the challenging requests she receives from clients, and how trying something new brings out her creative spirit. Jane's goal is to inspire quilters to go out of their comfort zone and just have fun creating.

Jane's workshop is called "Love of Pets Fabric Collage". If you ever wanted to make a quilt of your

pet, then this is the class for you. Your pattern will be a photo enlargement that you bring to class, and Jane will demonstrate the raw edge appliqué technique she uses. It's a fun, forgiving, cut-and glue method that uses no fusible. It will not be necessary to bring your sewing machine.

Century of Women's Progress

Century of Women's Progress 2020 Story Quilt Challenge!

The Century of Women's Progress Quilt Challenge is a voluntary collaboration of quilt enthusiasts, arts organizations, and museum and historical groups in the San Francisco Bay Area.

We are seeking a wide array of small quilts (30"h x 20"w) using traditional, contemporary, and innovative techniques, inspired by any aspect of progress for women and girls in the United States. The focus can be an individual woman, all women and groups of women, movements, organizations, historical events, and personal experiences between 1920 and the present. An entry into this competition includes an original quilt and the accompanying story about the subject of that quilt.

Entries will be accepted 12/1/2019 through 1/4/2020, so you have plenty of time to find an interesting subject and conceptualize your quilt! Eighty quilts selected by a professional jury will be exhibited in an online gallery through February 2022, and forty quilts from the online exhibit will be featured in a special exhibit at East Bay Heritage Quilters' biennial show, *Voices in Cloth*, March 21 & 22, 2020, at Craneway Pavilion on the waterfront in Richmond, California.

Sewlutions

Do you wish your work area was more organized? How many of you have walked into your quilting space and said, "I wish I could find that teal fabric with the yellow flowers on it," and it takes way too much time to actually find it, if it can be found at all? After starting completely over building a quilt space, I was recently able to implement some organizational wisdom I acquired along the way.

I found organizing fabric first by size, then by color works best for me. All of my fat quarters are folded the same way and each color has a basket that is an open plastic mesh, so that you can see the fabrics without pulling them off the shelf. If they don't completely fill the basket, I use book ends to hold the fat quarters in place so they can be easily added or sub-



tracted. Yardage is folded around comic book cardboard and sorted by color, and then it is kept on an open bookshelf so that it can easily be identified. I



also use the same approach with other things in my space. Thread, buttons and ribbon are sorted by color and stored in clear jars on the bookshelf. I think of my fabric and all the colors in my quilt room as a decoration as well as inventory, and try to display them like a quilt shop. The tools I use frequently like pins and cutter and seam ripper are stored in drawer organizers that are clipped to-

gether for ease of use. Since they are always together, I don't have to chase them down each time I need one of them. After each project, I create order again before I start on the next one. That works for me, makes me happy and feeling creative. If you have trouble finding things in your quilt space, consider seeking out organizing books or websites that will help you find an organizing style that works for you.

Get ready to share! The 2019 SRQG Challenge is due on <u>August 3</u> at our business meeting! Are you finishing up your entry so that you can share it with us?


Inspire your friends and fellow members!


Community Quilts

40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system, and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convales- cent hospitals, and others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.

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

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
