Carole Behike

We are grateful that Carole Behlke stepped up to take on the SRQG Treasurer's position for the past two years. Keeping any group of artists organized with balanced accounts is no easy task, especially one with members of such diverse focus and talent.



Carole came to us from Ohio a few years ago. One of her favorite pastimes during her working years was to travel with friends throughout the Midwest and hit as many quilt shops as she could find. She even ventured onto a quilting cruise. For 25 years, she has collected quilting kits with the intent that when she retired, she would get to work with them. It took her 10 years to complete one. Carole still considers herself to be a "relatively" new quilter. She started off doing lots of embroidery; making samplers was a real passion in 1989. She even traveled to Plymouth, Massachusetts, to take a class based on reproducing one of the oldest samplers still in existence. She's still working on it.

Now that she has officially retired after four attempts, Carole has the opportunity to revisit all those kits she bought over the years. Every January she gets an organizing bug and reviews some of her kit collection to see if she still likes them. Some she turns into community quilts and some get repacked for future consideration. In her attempt to clean up, she has even discovered that she bought some kits two or three times without realizing it. She must have really liked those designs, but not enough to make them ... yet.

She learned the basics of quilting from friends in Ohio, cutting templates from cereal boxes and learning how to pull fabrics based on hues and values. There weren't many quilt stores around when she started, so she picked up how to work with fabrics that were not coordinated, unlike what we find so

often available in stores today. First drawn to traditional fabrics, Carole goes for fall colors and primitive designs. She makes most of her projects with the intent that they keep someone warm, so the smallest size she likes to work with is 40" x 60", like our community quilts. Not one for wall hangings, she is proudest of a Hawaiian quilt she made that took eight years to complete (including five years to applique) that measures 120" x 120". Of course, as with so many of her other quilts, she gave it to someone else.

A big fan of piecing, Carole enjoys taking as many classes as she can to learn new techniques. The problem with that is her stack of UFO's continues to multiply. Add the number of kits to the number of UFO's, Carole has enough stash to keep her very busy for a very long time, not to imply she won't go shopping for something new. She recently finished a UFO she's had for 20 years. Carole keeps a project or two in the trunk of her car so she can have something to work on when she and Mike travel to car shows or other events. She enjoys traveling a lot and always keeps some handwork close by, like English paper pieced hexies.

Carole always finds something to inspire her at SRQG. There is such a conglomeration of knowledge and amazing variety of techniques that members use. She appreciates having access to our excellent library. One of her favorite activities is working with community quilts; she feels that time is better spent working on quilts for someone else rather than for personal use.

A great fan of our "sew days," Carole likes to go around the room to see what people are working on. She appreciates that there are many members who come to sew days just for the socialization and some who never finish anything. She also likes to encourage new quilters, supporting the current resurgence of interest in the craft, but she is concerned that it is becoming alien to the younger generations and that it may become a "lost art."

While living in Ohio, she learned how to quilt on a long-arm. Renting time on one for \$18 an hour would let her finish up a couple quilts in a short period. Because she practiced on the long-arm, she is just not comfortable with quilting on her domestic machine. Now she sends many of her quilts back to friends in the Midwest for quilting.

Carole has joined many smaller groups in shops or people's homes, as well as both Santa Rosa guilds. She finds groups of 10 or so people for embroidery or guilting and appreciates spending time with new

May 16 & 17, 2019 Colleen Pelfrey

Program: "Life With A Border Around It" Workshop: "Taking Out The Dye"

Colleen Pelfrey will be our guest speaker on May 16. Colleen grew up in northern California, attended college at UC Davis, and started teaching school as a 4th grade teacher in 1983. She retired in June 2017. She began sewing when she was in eighth grade and sewed dresses back



when she used to wear dresses! She made her first quilt after her first year in college. She made her second quilt years later. When her two sons got older she started playing with designing quilts and creating with and on fabric. Just as much as she likes quilting, she likes telling the stories that go along with her quilts, hence, "Life With a Border Around It." In addition to quilting she likes hiking, biking, motorcycling, cats, family, hugs, and Nutella, but not necessarily in that order!



On Friday, May 17, Colleen will present her workshop entitled "Taking the Dye Out." This workshop is a little a different as you don't need to bring your sewing machine unless you want to, and there isn't a project you need to finish. Colleen will start with a little showand-tell of quilts she has

made using discharge paste in the design process. She then teaches a variety of techniques for using discharge paste on fabric, and demonstrates how to use all of the different tools she has acquired. Then she lets you play with her toys and gives you any assistance you might need or want for the rest of the day. Colleen provides all the tools and the discharge paste. All you need to bring are pieces of fabric you would like to try it out on. She sends you home with a small container of discharge paste so you can continue to play if you wish. The cost of this workshop is \$40 and will be held at the Village Sewing Center.

Jane Tenorio Coscorelli Program: "Quilt-A-Beast"

Workshop: "Altar Quilt - Day of the Dead"


"Quilt-a-Beast" is the title of the lecture that will be presented by Jane Tenorio Coscorelli on June 20. Jane is a free-lance artist who has combined her artistic talent and love of quilting to create "1/4 Inch Publishing." For the past thirteen years she has successfully designed and produced her product line of books, patterns, fabrics and notions. She is a renowned author, artist, and quilter whose talents have been featured in the Steven Spielberg movie "How to Make an American Quilt," Vista Quilts, and on Simply Quilts. Jane has taught across the coun-



try educating adults and children through sharing her stories. Jane has been a staple at literacy conventions, ethnic festivals, and national quilt shows. In 2005 she joined a creative team of studio designers to create fabric lines that represent her Latin heritage. With her vibrant choice of colors, patterns, and texture designs she hopes to inspire the quilter in all of us.

The workshop on Friday, June 21, is "Altar Quilt - Day of Dead." Learn what the Day of the Dead celebration is all about using fabric. You will build your own Altar quilt and embellish it with the memories of those you love. The pattern will be provided. The workshop will be held at the Village Sewing Center.







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Welcome Committee

A few notes from Welcome Committee for new members and old: SRQG's Welcome Committee was created to greet and orient newcomers to our rather large guild. We want new members and guests to feel valued and appreciated, rather than lost and nervous in a crowd. If you have a guest to share with the guild, please let me know so that the guest receives a proper welcome. As seasoned members we have an obligation to model respectable behavior, such as silencing our camera phones during the meeting. Also, conversations should be whispered in one's ear rather than spoken out loud. Photographs may be taken after a meeting with permission from the artist. If there is a teacher who brings merchandise for sale, business can only be conducted before or after the meeting...not during even if the chairperson forgets to cover the table leaving the loot visible. In the back of the room are Silent Auction tables filled with books, fabrics, and garage sale-type items (mostly sewing related). Regarding the fabrics, one may take whatever they like and put a donation in the jar on the Library Table where one checks out books, patterns, rulers, DVD's, and Go-Baby die cutters.

For the garage sale items and books there are Post-It's on items where one writes their name and a bid, such as **Rhonda \$1.00**. If another person wants the item they may write their name and a higher bid. Once the silent auction closes (usually 30 minutes after the meeting ends) the highest bidder wins the item and puts the money in the jar on the Library Table. The library staff keeps an eye on the tables and the bids. All funds from the silent auction table support SRQG's many programs.

Along the back wall of the room are bright yellow committee markers, Sew-a-Row, Block-of-the-Month, Community Quilts, Technique Sharing Workshops, Programs and Workshops, and more. Here one may participate in any or all of the activities the guild has to offer. Always available is Opportunity Quilt Raffle Ticket sales, even when the 'OP Quilt' is on tour or at a show. It is recommended that each member donate \$20.00 over the course of a year towards this fundraiser. It's one of the two main fundraisers we have.

The other is the **Boutique**. Betty and her team of fabulous helpers have wonderful items for sale and a fun raffle with delightful items to win. Bring food to share on your birth month and six months later for the smorgasbord-style snackies that augment the sandwich or salad you bring.

Friendship Blocks

April showers bring May flowers, but it also brings lots of really cute "Scrappy Kittens Galore!" Ann Nolen is thrilled with all the blocks that have arrived. Just like real, life kittens, each one has its own personality. There are only two blocks still available! If you would like to make one, just shoot me an email and I'll sign you up.

It's Winter!

Joyce Wood is requesting winter-themed blocks. These can be any size up to 12 ½ inches unfinished. Any style and type: paper pieced, embellish to your heart's content if you wish, applique, paint on fabric, or Zentangle, or just a traditional log cabin, or a churn dash in winter fabrics. Think Christmas, snowflakes, or rain or whatever. I'm sure you can think of something that has to do with winter. Anything goes. Contact me and I'll put you on the sign-up sheet. Thanks!!

Sewlutions

Sometimes I feel that I am experiencing the "Goldilocks Rule" with my quarter inch seams. Some seams are too wide, some seams are too narrow. Every once in a while, I get my seams

"JUST RIGHT." If you find that your quilt blocks end up a bit too small, or the points of your stars or triangles get chopped off at the tips, or your seams are not lining up perfectly with each other, here



are some handy Sewlutions to help:

- Use a quarter-inch quilting foot
- Use a stack of blue painter's tape next to your sewing foot
- Use a thick foam tape like a Dr. Scholl's foam bandage next to your sewing foot
- Use A commercially available sewing guide that you can buy at quilt shops or fabric stores
- Use a piece of weather-stripping foam
- And TEST TEST!

How to test:

- Cut 3 short 1 ½ wide strips of fabric
- Sew these 3 strips together
- Press the seams to one side
- Measure the center strip
- The center strip should match EXACTLY 1". If it is narrower or wider adjust your seam guide and check again.

Remember: quilting is an art and a science. Aspiring to be consistent with your seams will bring you better results and will save you time, and that time can be used to make more quilts!!

COMMUNITY QUILT SIZES

If you are making donation quilts on your own, these are the approximate sizes most needed.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter and Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, and teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system, and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convales- cent hospitals, and others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.

Wine Country Quilt Show

The due date for Quilt Show entries has passed. Now is the time to focus on getting your entries complete.

Reminders:

Sleeves:

Please place a sleeve on the top edge of your quilt. This sleeve may be basted or safety pinned on the top and bottom edges. If your quilt is longer than 86", you must place a sleeve 86" from the bottom of your quilt. No quilts are allowed to touch the floor, and this keeps them from doing so.

Labels:

Please print out a quilt show label from the website: www.mqsc.org under Quilt Show Entry Info tab. In the instructions there is a link that says: Quilt Label in blue lettering about half way down the instructions, as Item "2." under "How to Prepare and Deliver Your Quilt to the Show." Complete the label and pin or baste it to the BACK of the quilt in the lower RIGHT corner. Please fold your quilt so that this label is facing up.

If you need to pull your quilt entry:

Should you need to pull your quilt, please notify Trina Jahnsen at tirriver@yahoo.com by MAY 6th. It is very important that you notify us early about pulls. Pulling your quilt at the last minute means moving quilts to fill your vacated reserved place. Everything has been printed for take in, and a last minute pull creates a lot of extra work for many people.

Delivery:

Please deliver your quilt(s) on Thursday, May 30 to the Vet's Memorial Bldg, 1351 Maple Avenue, Santa Rosa, to the room on the east side of the building between 6 and 7 p.m. If you are delivering quilts for someone else, have a written note authorizing you to drop them off. Same thing is applicable if you pick up a quilt for someone else at the end of the show. You must have the pickup slips to pick up your quilt or anyone else's quilt.

The quilts that have been entered are lovely and the show is going to be well received by the attendees! Tell your friends and family to attend!



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
