President's Message

Have you ever been interested in attending a quilt show in a foreign country? You might look into a tour group. They take the stress out of travelling by handling your luggage and making all the reservations, from airlines and accommodations to many meals, and also escort you to some amazing featured locations depending on the tour you choose. In January 2020, Toni Anderson, Mary Ann Hayre, and I all ended up on the same tour in Japan.

After landing in Osaka we were bussed to Kyoto for four nights, and then onto the Bullet train which sped us at 199 miles per hour to Tokyo. Our hotels were lovely.

While in Kyoto, the city of 1,600 shrines, we were impressed with the beauty of the Golden Pavilion.

We went to a fake food workshop and made a dessert bowl of ice cream and fruit. Great fun.





Then on to Nara with 1,500 deer that were smaller than our deer (more like dogs than deer). Several ate out of our hands; strangely enough, the deer would bow their heads three times each time they took the food. They were on the grounds of the Todai-ji Temple, the largest wooden building in the world. That evening we went to an authentic Japanese restaurant where we were entertained by the Kyoto equivalent of geishas.

New day, another temple ... this one the Kiyomizu Buddhist Temple in the western mountains. Then on to Nishiki street market where we found an incredible needle and pin shop which has survived at least three generations.

We went to the Kyoto kaleidoscope museum and made a simple but beautiful kaleidoscope ... talk about unlimited quilt designs!

On our last day in Kyoto, we went to the Fushimi Inari Shito Shrine – in the rain. This is the shrine with the 10,000 orange torii gates always shown in ads for Japan. Even in the rain a stunner ("Tori" means bird perch). Soon we were on the afternoon bullet train to Tokyo.

Day 5 was indigo dying. Then to the Sensoji Buddhist Temple which has a huge street market ... think of food like delicious melon bread and all the souvenirs you could possibly want. Then on to the tea ceremony where we learned how to make and serve tea according to custom.

On day 6 we took a two-hour bus trip while hoping the clouds would clear in order to see Mt. Fuji – no such luck. We went to the Itchiku Kubota museum, dedicated to the renowned kimono maker, to see the incredible kimonos he made during his lifetime. (And there was snow!)

Back to Tokyo and Nippori Street, basically the fabric mart of Tokyo. We walked the street and visited many fabric shops, probably buying more than we should have.

Finally we got to go the big event, the Tokyo International Quilt Festival for two days! What a treat of quilts and vendors. It was held in the Tokyo Dome (home of the Giants,) on the playing field. We were looking at world famous quilts, with no white glovers in sight. People were touching the quilts!! Totally unacceptable here.

This was truly an adventure of a lifetime.

Quilt Challenge



Needle and Thread by Jim Jensen

Adventurer, sports woman, deep sea spear fishing expert ... accomplished quilter? It's not often you meet someone who can lay claim to all those talents ... then there's Elaine Tucker.



Although Elaine learned to sew as a young woman, she has been quilting for just 18 years. As with so many of us, her first

granddaughter was her initial motivation. She chose a paper-pieced crazy patch quilt as her first project; it was supposed to be difficult for a beginner, but she had great fun with it. Elaine's life-long love of sewing was inspired by her mother and an aunt who, at 101, still lives in Canada. Her aunt pieced by machine, but guilted by hand, and was a master sewist.

While living in Fort Bragg, Elaine's sewing interests branched out into the world of long-arm machine quilting. She travelled to Kansas and Salt Lake City to learn Handi Quilter from Jamie Wallen and Claudia Pfeil. She was quickly inspired by their techniques involved with ruler work and free-motion guilting (FMQ).

Elaine's primary inspiration these days is our SRQG. She loves that there are so many artists who do so many different styles of quilting; she finds she is inspired at different levels by the different talents.

Not one to settle into one style of expression, she

likes to change things up in her quilting. Elaine enjoys paper-piecing. art quilts. traditional piecing, even some of the modern designs. She enjoyed doing FMQ, but these days she prefers her computerized machine. Elaine prefers to concentrate on her individual projects and does not consider herself a "prolific"



quilter. A fan of Tula Pink and Kaffe Fassett, Elaine favors bright colors. She used to be a fan of Asian fabrics, but like so many other things that change, they lost their appeal for her.

She admits to having quite a few UFOs. On some projects Elaine will go just so far, and then switch to another quilt. She has a king size quilt she made 14 years ago that's still needing а border. With another halfdozen quilts waiting in

line, she wanted to become a better quilter before finishing them, and feels now that she's ready.

But there is always time for new projects! There's a "Storm at Sea" in the planning stages. She has a mystery quilt from two or three years ago, medallions, and more dahlia flowers. With all that going on, she needs a break once in a while so she turns to her passion for genealogy

Elaine joined SRQG twelve years ago. She loves the friendliness, openness, and generosity of all the members. We are a community that is very giving and kind, and that is our strength.

Program: "Silk and Salvage - New Quilts from Res-

cued Materials"

Workshop: "Improvisational Piecing - "Crazy Patch-

work Recipes"

The Program presentation at our meeting on April 16 will be presented by the teaching team from "Silk and Salvage." Get the lowdown on the guilts that Sue Fox and Julia McLeod make and why these materials intrigue them and us. Learn where they look for and find materials. and how they prove the fiber content. See how they each



work with precision or with abandon. Their presentation will include digital slides and a trunk show.

Workshop – Friday, April 17 Improvisational Piecing - Crazy Patchwork Recipes (for silk, linen, wool, vintage and unusual fabrics)

Improvisational piecing is not new, but the "rules" for sewing silk, linen, or wool in an improvisational manner call for a different level of attention than does working with standard quilters cotton. You will learn how silk, linen, wool, and other fibers are handled differently than cotton.



Once you know the distinct qualities of each, you'll be ready to use and mix these disparate fabrics with confidence.

Sue and Julia will show you how by deftly sharing similar colors and/or related patterning between the different types of components. You will be able to combine several varieties of art part recipes together into one project, resulting in a quilt that has vitality and spirit.

Sewlutions

These days there are sew many quilting apps out there designed to make your quilting life easier. They can help with all aspects from designing the initial layout, to choosing the fabric and cutting it correctly. Many are free, and some have a small cost, but they can save you money and time in the long run. I have done a little research on the more popular apps, and here is what I found:

Quilting Tutorials by MSQC provides hundreds of tutorials and patterns. It is available for iPhone, iPad, and Android and is free.

QuiltingCalc makes quilting calculators from Robert Kaufman Fabrics. It has a fabric measurement converter, a backing and batting calculator, a square-ina-square calculator, a set-in and corner triangle calculator. It is available for iPhone, iPad, and Android, and is free.

Quiltography is a full-scale quilting app that can help you design your own patterns. It is a very robust tool for helping you manage your stash. It is available for iPad, and is \$14.99.

QuiltWizard is an app that allows you to test out fabrics in your stash or store. Take a picture of the fabric and use that photo in preloaded templates to get a preview of what the final product would look like. It is available for iPhone and iPad, and is \$4.99.

Blockfab helps you make blocks with its offering of 50 traditional quilt block templates. It also provides you with yardage information for each block, and strip cutting suggestions. It is available for iPhone and iPad, and is free.

Quilt Shops is designed by Quilter's Club of America to help quilters find local and not so local quilt shops. Considering a shop hop? It is for iPhone and iPad, and is free.

QuiltFab gives you the ability to accurately determine how much fabric you will need for a project. It even considers shrinkage information! It is available for iPhone and iPad, and is free.

Stash Star is a simple way to keep track of your stash. You can organize it and carry that information with you while you shop. It is available for iPhone and iPad, and is free.

QuiltSandwich helps you figure out yardage. It has a calculator that is helpful when determining the backing and binding measurements needed for a project. It is available for iPhone and iPad, and is \$4.99.

This is only a sampling of free or low cost tools to help you and the great news is that they are portable and always with you!

you like that Kelly green.) The green can have soft, brown tones or even gray tones in it. Aw heck, it can even have pink in it. Let your imagination go wild. Experiment and make more than one block. Remember you can't win without entering at least one, and who knows – you just might have the lucky Irish in you and win several.

Once you open the entry form, please check that there is a release date of 2020 just below the submission steps. If not then you will need to refresh the cache on your computer as it has pulled up last year's form.





Community Quilts

What is VOM???? Come to the April 2 meeting to learn all about it and enjoy the parade of 100 quilts.

Verity is another place in town that receives quilts from us. Verity offers support, counseling, and compassion for survivors of rape and sexual assault. The quilts we donate are usually "happy" colors and lap to larger sized.

Large quilts go to the emancipated youth. Kids aging out of foster care are given a basket of essentials for living on their own with a large quilt to cover a bed. They also are offered help to live on their own. These guilts are in the range of 50" x 65".

Public Health nurses visit new moms and share quilts with them. The Memorial Pediatrics Department has taken a few quilts for the first time. Quilts also go to seniors, the YWCA Safe House, and many to the NICU babies at Memorial and Sutter.

Lavella Cassinelli and her mini group make and distribute many quilts (582 last year) to veterans.

Thank you for all the love and hard work that goes into your quilts.



COMMUNITY QUILT SIZES

If you are making donation quilts on your own, these are the approximate sizes most needed.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter and Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, and teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system, and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convales- cent hospitals, and others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.

Friendship Blocks

Is there a block that has been calling out to you that you would like to see made up in different fabrics? This is the perfect opportunity to start a Friendship Block of your very own.

The process is simple. You come up with an idea. Check to see if you have at least ten credits, then choose a block and a size for it, or choose a color combination for varied blocks. Then you contact me and we fine tune your idea and put it out to our members to sign up to make your blocks. Before you know it you have enough blocks to make a beautiful quilt of your own, and the joy of knowing each block was made by your friends at guild just for you. Think of it this way: as quilters we usually make, have made, or work on quilts for others. It is more unusual that someone makes a quilt for us. Nothing quite compares to that feeling when you see the work that others have taken the time to do just for you. So please consider starting a Friendship Block this year.




