

In this last "clue" for the mystery quilt, there are two blocks.




Block #8 is a single nine-

Clue #9






Block #8





Little Bits with Jackie Pitts

BITS AND PIECES

Now that some of us are venturing out and even going on trips it's time to consider sandwich bag projects. A sandwich bag project is one which can fit into a zip lock bag either sandwich size or slightly larger and then into your pocket or your purse or your day bag to be enjoyed in the car [if you are not the driver] or at the beach or in the waiting room or in the back yard. People who knit or crochet do portable projects all the time. People who sew can too with a little planning.

What can you make with a sandwich bag project? I wouldn't make a bed quilt that way though our foremothers pretty much did. This method works best for small things. Things that are not speed pieced. Things which can be finger pressed. Think of these small things as spice or sweetening. You wouldn't sit your family down to a meal of oregano. But it adds a lot to the pasta sauce.



Small sewing projects could include soft jewelry, glasses cases [sunglasses or reading glasses], travel kits, sewing kits, bookmarks, tiny pillows to be filled with dried lavender or catnip depending on the recipient, embroidered or

crazy quilted picture frames, wall art, Christmas tree ornaments, party favors, needle books, pin cushions, coasters, placemats, doll quilts, small stuffies [especially in the Waldorf tradition], and nearly anything to be worn by an infant or a doll.

One especially sweet sandwich bag project is to take a readymade onesie and hand embroider the neck edge. Feather stitch is good for this though all members of the chain stitch family have a bit of give to them and will work. I like shaded pastels or brights for this. I use three strands of DMC. If you want you can add a little ruffle as a skirt for a girl baby or a few freehand flowers or perhaps a bullion rose. A small hand applique on the chest would be nice too. Then you have a unique welcome for the new baby in your family, your neighborhood, or your community of faith.

Small handheld projects are the ideal way to explore new techniques. They take comparatively little time and effort to complete and breathtakingly little material. They can act as a 'no, thank you' portion. When

our children were small they were asked to take a small portion of new foods after which they were entitled to say 'no, thank you' to that food for life. By the time you have finished a foundation-



pieced brooch for your friend or a reverse applique glasses case for your uncle you know whether you want to do larger and more elaborate projects in this technique, and you have a finished project and are not haunted by a UFO. Christmas and family birth-days find you prepared.

When packing a sandwich bag project I use small brass safety pins if I need pins at all. I put my needle firmly in a piece of felt or fabric or in a needle book. Cutting out is best done at home but I keep a small scissors for snipping thread. If snipping thread is all you need scissors for consider taking a container of dental floss and using the tiny blade to snip your sewing thread. I have a small crazy quilt sewn partly in the air over the Atlantic. With the dental floss snipper it may be possible to sew on an airplane again.

The Guild library is rich in designs for small projects. 'Miniature Quilts Magazine' is a good place to start. Books of designs for foundation piecing give good ideas for brooches or small quilts. Books on specific techniques often have small projects or details of larger projects which can be adapted to



small projects. Online sources are abundant starting with www.annwoodhandmade.com with suitable patterns for hand sewing, many of them free.

Years ago a physical therapist came to treat my husband in our home. Looking around she said, "I see you are a quilter." When she left I went and sat where she had sat and looked around. From there I could see 13 sewn items. Only one of these was a full size quilt folded on a shelf. One was a pieced table topper. The rest were little things most of which had been sandwich bag projects.

Sew-lutions

We all have a love for fabric. It is what we admire, what we collect, what we pet, and what we use to create our quilts. We owe it all to fabric designers.

It got me wondering, exactly what are the responsibilities of a fabric designer, from concept to production? A little research revealed the answer.

A fabric designer's job can be broken down into six categories:

The first responsibility is to print and pattern. This entails creating a new motif and taking that to new color ways. This is typically done by arranging layouts in CAD (aka computer-aided design). It is also useful to have skills in Photoshop and Illustrator which can be used to create repeat patterns.

The second responsibility is to create color palettes. A common color language for all designers is to use Pantone chips. The factory will bulk dye to the designer's specification. Designers may choose to work with a limited palette which allows for a quicker turn-around time and eliminates dye waste. Samples are then sent to the designer for quality checks and approval.

The third responsibility is to participate in project development. Creating sample projects and being able to communicate with the public can be a key skill that might make a designer more successful. Sharing construction and fiber knowledge is one way to get a product the exposure it needs.

Responsibility number four is to develop custom and line projects. Custom projects are assigned to name brands, a private label or a licensor. Designers are tasked with bringing the artwork and vision of that client to life. Line projects are available to any client where it might potentially be bought by a retailer.

Responsibility number five is to participate in Market Week. Setting up a stylish display and arranging products for a beautiful presentation is important. Interacting with customers and sales reps and explaining the design and product are all key to a successful Market Week.

And finally, responsibility number six is trend research. This often starts at Market and is followed up with online searches on sites such as Pinterest and blogsites.

I thought now might be a good time to share the totals on baby basics thus far in the community project for the Lombardi Campus of Santa Rosa Community Health. With permission from the SRQG board I began asking for certain baby supplies in February. The community at large responded just as I knew they would. Santa Rosa Quilt Guild is incredibly generous with the children. This warms the cockles of my heart. Moonlight Quilters of Sonoma County also came through in a big way. They gave the closet a one-time gift of 50 baby quilts. They are beautiful and inspiring. Also, I have a friend who works with Charles Schulz Enterprises. Every week thousands of items from all over the world show up seeking permission to use Peanuts characters on their merchandise. The Schulz family determines if the proposed product meets the quality standards for sales purposes. After a determination is made the submitted examples are considered "excess." There are other groups that get to go through the Snoopy swag, too, but we get first dibs on the baby closet items. Plus, people have donated gently worn baby clothing, blankets, etc.

Here are some totals:

37 people and 2 entities have donated 791 baby closet items. Of those, we have received 46 Cat friends and critters - (Special thanks to Alana's granddaughters for selecting stuffed toys for the wee ones), 55 Bibs, 7 Blankets, 19 Burp cloths, 51 Extra bags, 70 Hats, 88 Journals, 89 pieces of other clothing, 49 Onesies, 39 Outfit Sets, 53 Quilts, 73 Receiving blankets, 28 Sleepers, 182 pair of socks, 19 Well-Baby Bags, 200 positive affirmation card sets, and finally, 200 pieces of gently used baby clothing (from Lorna's granddaughter). These numbers are pulled from my inventory sheets. Monique, my liaison, is working from a spreadsheet. (Spreadsheets give me a tummy ache.) It is important to remember is that the Well-Baby Bags each contain a receiving blanket, 3 burp cloths, 1

cat friend or critter with a dolly blanket, a journal, 2 pair of socks, and a knit hat. (My knit hats are heavenly, like a crown of stars, navy blue with tiny white V shapes scattered about.) I have heard that the Well-Baby Bags are happily received and that they bring comfort and joy, which is the whole idea.

August's **Challenge** for the baby closet: If one is inspired to sew, the closet needs **bibs**. The kerchief is popular now. I took a T-shirt, cut two squares12.5-inch. Fold on the diagonal, pin for sewing, leaving an opening for turning. (When using stretchy fabric use stretchy stitch, zig zag.) Trim corners, turn right side out, top

stitch and add closures at corners, snaps, hook and loop tape, or buttons. You can find these instructions on the TSW page or use your favorite bib pattern.

Community Quilts



Thank you for your continued work on community quilts. We have collected lots and they are being given out to the community. We are looking towards having a low-key quiltathon in October. We will see what the covid situation is as we get closer to the time. The usual process of making

If you are making donation quilts on your own, these are the approximate sizes most needed.



Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.					


Thank You Pam






