
Community Quilts

Technique Sharing Workshops

March brought us two long time SRQG members generously sharing their knowledge. March 1st Melissa Trunick took us on a mysterious adventure that ended with a beautiful star. The mystery quilt was a star that is kind of a mystery in itself. Melissa told us it didn't appear to have a name but was in a quilt made over 100 years ago. Because she couldn't find a pattern she created her own. If you'd like to see what it looks like check out our website under TSW. Those who brought their sewing machines stayed until it was time to lock up.

Our second TSW in March was presented by Sharon Fry who showed us how to make circles, bulls eyes, and drunkard's path blocks. Sharon is not one to let any fabric go to waste so she even let us in on her secrets for using all the scraps from the circles to make even more circles! Here's what Sharon said about this technique.

"More than ten years ago I saw a quilt that I could not get out of my mind in our guild's library book QUILTS FROM AUNT AMY by Mary Tendall Etherington and Connie Tesene. Not only did I like the design, but I loved the technique. I was able to get the look of a Drunkard's Path without having to sew curves, and it is really easy to do. The bonus is that I figured out how to use the cut-aways to make smaller and smaller blocks, as I am known for wanting to use up my scraps."

Thank you so much Melissa and Sharon for your time and energy. Sharon also gets a special thank you because we used her as our pilot experiment using the guild's new projector.

April has two more TSWs in store, neither of which is quilting. At our first meeting June Moes will teach us how to make knit hats and scarves using a knitting loom. If you want to learn this technique be sure to get the yarn and loom (see website for supply list).

After the April 19 meeting Jan Westerman will teach us the tricky technique for making pillowcases with a nice border. We have been making pillowcases for our troops in Afghanistan using this method but you can make them for other purposes as well. They make great gifts too! Supply list is available on our website.



Sew-A-Row

April 5th is "Time to pass your row to the next person" day at the guild.

Friendship Blocks

Explanation of program: The FB program is a "time release" block exchange - This means that every block you receive must be offset with a FB credit that you can acquire in one of the ways listed below (or, in other words, "there is no free lunch".) Anyone with at least 3 credits, may request up to 20 blocks to be made for them. Think of this as "borrowing" the other 17 credits from the bank so you can get your blocks early. If you actually receive 20 blocks, 3 of these are offset by your qualifying 3 credits - but you then OWE the bank the other 17 credits.

The ways in which you get credits: make a FB for someone else; make a block for the opportunity guilt; make a block for the President's gift .


There are quite a few members who have 20 credits or more already; there are even more members who are more than halfway to 20 credits; and there are many, many who have at least 3 credits and are therefore eligible to request blocks to be made for them. Let me know what I can do to help you initiate a request for blocks.

I cleaned out the files and there are also guite a few credits available from those who are no longer members, or from credit donations. These are being raffled off in groups of 20 credits. Tickets for three prizes of 20 credits each were sold in March, and will continue to be sold at the April business meeting. The raffle will be held at the end of the meeting and three lucky winners will be immediately available to request friendship blocks, without having had to make any in return! Tickets are \$1 each or 6 for \$5.

At this time, there are still two opportunities left to participate in Rhonda's friendship block, and we just opened Judy Bello's request for the "Cornerstone" block (the Dec block of the month pattern). Justine's modified "Lady of the Lake" block request might be ready at the next meeting, and perhaps my applique teapot block.

I look forward to seeing all the blocks that will be coming in this year.

Guild Retreat 2012

The first SRQG Quilt Retreat is scheduled for Aug 5 -10 at Zephyr Point Presbyterian Conference Center, right on Lake Tahoe (just north of Stateline on the east shore.) The cost is only \$425 per person double occupancy (\$200 single supplement) - this includes room with two queen beds, and all meals except one dinner, and the sewing room. There will be no TVs, radios or phones to distract. We have the sewing room 24 hours a day! You may request special diets and room accommodations. If you want to share a room and don't have a roommate, I will put you in touch with the other "solos."

This retreat is open to anyone who wants to come play with us - they need not be a Guild member. The sewing room has an entire window wall facing the Lake, so the lighting is wonderful. There will be one table per person, and additional ironing and cutting stations.

To make this happen, we need to commit to 12 rooms. At the time of this writing, we have quite a few rooms reserved but need to fill 3 or 4 more rooms. If you are interested, let me know earlier rather than late. You may download the flyer and registration form from our website "Downloads" link (www.srqg.org) or call or email me and I'll send one to you. It would be great if I had all the deposits (\$200) by the end of March, but the absolute drop dead date for deposits is the April 5th Guild meeting.

Bring a spouse or significant other or friend who wants to enjoy the local activities: golfing, fishing, hiking, horseback riding, many different forms of boating, swimming in Zephyr Point's lagoon, etc.

- 40" x 40" -- 42" x 42" Toddler quilts in bright colors, or lap quilts in adult themes
- 38-40" x 48-52" Valley of the Moon (big kids)
- 40" x 60" Adult/seniors (only a few needed)

None of our recipients need anything larger than this. If you have enough to make a larger top, consider making it into two smaller ones, which can help two people, and are easier to finish.

SRQG Challenge 2012

We hope you will take part in "The Quilt Guild Challenge 2012". The challenge runs from March 2nd until August 2, where the challenges will be displayed on stage. This year's challenge is designed for quilters of all levels and interests. There are three sections in which to participate. Feel free to do one or all three!

• The first section is to make a block using either your first or last name's initial, like R for Rodgers or Roberts. This section of the challenge is geared toward the beginning quilter.



- In the second section you make a traditional quilt block in which the name of the block begins with either your first or last name's initial. For example if your first or last name begins with "Z" you could make the Zinnias, Zodiac Stars or Zygocactus block. Choose the block according to your skill level.
- The last section is geared to the art quilter. This quilt must have a minimum 25% of the surface with items found at the hardware store.



In all sections of this challenge the block size is your choice. Make a block that is really small or really large.

So often people choose to participate in these things and afterwards wonder what to do with the block. Use your block as a starter to make a pillow, a baby quilt, a wall hanging, a table runner, a community quilt, a bed size quilt, a gift for a friend or donate it to the "orphan blocks" group. One idea that comes to mind is to

finish your block and enter it in the Citrus Fair in February or the county fair in 2013.

The library will have many books with patterns for either the initial or the traditional block. Ask Sharon Fry, our outstanding librarian, for some help to point you in the right direction. Good luck and let the fun begin!
