

### **Coming in August**

#### BARBARA CONFER

PROGRAM ~ AUGUST 15 ~ "VISIONS OF NATURE: CUT,

TORN AND SHREDDED FABRIC QUILTS"



Barbara Confer was born in Philadelphia to a military family. She spent her childhood moving every two or three years and attended nine schools. She later married her husband Don, a Navy pilot and continued moving! The Confers have two daughters and four grandchildren.

One of the consistent fac-

tors in Barbara's life was her mother's love of anything creative, and she encouraged Barbara to pursue creative activities. Barbara later combined her love of fabric and painting when she began to design and sew art quilts.

Barbara loves to show her quilts and she has entered and won awards in several exhibits. She belongs to the Petaluma Quilt Guild and Studio Art Quilt Association.

#### WORKSHOP ~ AUGUST 16TH ~ "MINI LANDSCAPE"

Students will have fun creating an 18" x 18" landscape quilt using small pieces of fabric scraps, trims and yarn. No pattern will be used except for an optional pattern for the tree in the foreground.

Because free motion stitching is an important technique in this art quilt, each student must have a sewing machine that will accommodate this type of quilting.



The class will begin with

the three-layer method of constructing an art quilt. Other techniques will be free-style cutting, ripping and fringing fabric to achieve a spontaneous effect. Students will top-stitch through tulle over raw-edge applique, use fusible web and sheer fabrics to create an outdoor scene.

Students will be asked to complete some preparation prior to class.

The class which costs \$40, will be held at the Luther Burbank Art & Garden Center. Class starts promptly at 9:00 a.m., so please arrive at 8:30 a.m. for set-up.

40" x 60" Our big- gest need.	Please use <u>bright colors</u> for young children or fabrics that will <u>appeal to teenagers</u> .
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults/seniors. We give these to The Council on Aging and Secret Santa.
Doll Quilts	For little boys & girls. We collect these all year and donate during the holidays.
80" x 100"	Bed quilts for Wounded Warriors. We donate only a few of these large quilts.
32" x 40" (None needed)	The current need for NICU/baby quilts is being met using kits put together at Community Quilts work parties.



### In Loving Memory of Dotty Zagar, Founding Member



Dorothy Margaret "Dotty" Zagar, passed away peacefully in her sleep on June 30, 2013. Dotty was a four time cancer survivor. Yet despite her health problems, she lived life with a vivacious and cheerful attitude. Dotty was born in Roundup, Montana, on February 4, 1925, weighing only three pounds. The doctor told her mother she didn't have much of a chance to survive, so her mother sent the doctor away and placed Dotty in a basket of cotton on the oven door as an incubator. Dotty spent most of her childhood in Mullan, a silver mining town in the panhandle of Idaho, before making her home in Santa Rosa in 1947. She worked for many years at PG&E as secretary to the Operations Manager prior to retiring in 1968. Dotty had a lifelong love of crafts and needlework, and after she retired she was able to devote more time to this passion. It was in 1976, after taking a quilting class at SRJC, when she decided to start a guilt group. She invited other students from her class and in

her living room hosted the first meeting of what was to become the Santa Rosa Quilt Guild. The SRQG membership grew from the 12 ladies that day, to a membership over 250 strong today. Dotty was Past President, and its Historian for many years. In 1987 she was presented with the distinguished Honorary Life Member award. She loved the group and treasured the many friendships she made there. Dotty created hundreds of guilts large and small, some of which won blue ribbons at the

Sonoma County Fair. She had a special talent for color and design, and a skill for intricate even hand stitching. Like the Guild, Dotty was generous to the community. In 2011, she assembled a quilt of red, white and blue blocks made by members, and this quilt was delivered to Travis Air Force Base for a homecoming wounded warrior. Over the last three years she made over 300 baby and doll guilts; all of which were donated to local charities. With the hand quilting just completed on her last quilt, a full sized "Friendship Quilt", she finished sewing the sleeve on the back for its display the night before she passed away. Dotty and her husband Hank enjoyed traveling together. One highlight when they traveled on behalf of Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce to the sister city of Cloverdale, British Columbia, was being escorted by the Royal Canadian Mounties. Dotty, showing her Friendship Block quilt, March, 2013. Another highlight was a Rotary trip to Amsterdam



where Dotty later liked to tell about the fun she had steering a tugboat on the canal. Following a Rotary trip to England, Dotty was inspired to found Santa Rosa's "Inner Circle"; a women's auxiliary service and social group of the Rotary Club, which later became the Circle of Friends. We will remember that Dotty always wore her gold sewing bobbin necklace, and on her collar she always wore her American flag pin to honor the soldiers. She will be remembered by all who knew her for her youthful energy, cheerful attitude and generosity. Dotty was the loving wife of Hank Zagar of Santa Rosa for over 45 years, stepmother to Diane Gandara (David) of Napa; mother to the late Paul Cleek of Glendale; grandmother to Gary Cleek of New Jersey; and sister to Terry Skantel (Lovina) of Mullan Idaho, and numerous nieces and nephews in Kellogg and Mullan, Idaho. In lieu of flowers, the family requests a donation be made to the charity of your choice.

### Gleanings

Whatever happens between announcements and my ears I don't know but my expectations are often askew. I have two precious guilt tops that require extraordinary borders for an extraordinary friend recently laid to rest. With finite materials, I cut according to the supply list for Linda Wagner's much anticipated workshop on 'Borders.'

The workshop was packed! Every table had two souls. There were new faces like Mary and Janet. It is always a pleasure to see Barbara from MQSC. Then the "usuals" like Joanie and Alana. Also attending were Barbara C. and Shirley Ann, not seen often enough. My table mates, Judith, Pricilla, and Jan W were excellent company. Everyone is so thoughtful, giving, and kind. Program and Workshop leaders Nancy Dear and Lady Alford take tender loving care of us for six and a half hours even making much-appreciated lunch runs for some.

The workshop began with roll call and housekeeping announcements such as where the restrooms are and that cell phones should be silenced. We gathered around Linda. She started with show and tell then on to the lessons at hand. She brought excellent handouts that made more sense as the day progressed. Teaching mostly from Sharon Craig's book 'The Ultimate Log Cabin Block', we were instructed to make six-inch finished, halfsquare log cabin blocks. Cut more darks than light, stack and whack, shuffle fabrics, smallest dark is center, darks to the left, lights to the right - a memory tool in the form of a rhyme was helpful here. After sewing log sections together, finger press seam away from the center. The order of operations; sew, flip, finger press, re-stack. Now I know why my log cabins never turned out; they are complex!

I was very concerned about the measurements for my two guilt tops and the pre-cut strips but Linda told me to wait - she would get to that part later. I didn't want to further compromise my strip-sets knowing there was no margin for error and being short on materials for these all-important memory quilts. The solution: ask my classmates for extra strips of material to practice on. Judith began by giving me the first strip (a lovely brown) followed by a sparkly blue from Janet and as I made the rounds I gathered a sweet collection of materials that made a mini-quilt I call 'Gleanings'. At another point when Linda was near me I asked again for a consult regarding my specific quilt tops only to be declined.

#### Gleanings continued

"Do you want to jump ahead or do it right?" she asked. Anyone who knows me knows I want to jump ahead. But, I played according to her rules and with Phyllis holding my hand I managed to get the practice samples mostly right. We broke for lunch and then regrouped around Linda for the afternoon segment of the workshop. She introduced the halfsquare triangle to the log cabin. With only a couple of hours remaining I approached Linda and asked if now was a good time for my specific consult. She gave me the time I needed which made the scales fall from my eyes. She did math that - at first - made me dizzy and gave me a tummy ache but made perfect sense in the end. She used my 'Road to Arizona' as a sample for odd math examples. I ended up falling in love with the log cabin and now have the information and inspiration to complete my muchloved memory quilts in honor of my beloved and sorely missed girlfriend, Dyanna.

Thank you, Santa Rosa Quilt Guild, for sponsoring this marvelous education in the fabric arts. Workshops are held the Friday after the second guild meeting of most months. They are held at 2050 Yulupa Ave in Santa Rosa. They run from 9:00am until 3:30pm with a half-hour lunch break. They only

cost \$40.00, a steal of a deal for the caliber of instructors that SRQG Programs and Workshop directors engage.
