LAURA LEE FRITZ

PROGRAM THURSDAY, MAY 16, 2013 ~ "MINDFUL MEANDERING AND QUILTING EXTRAVAGANCES"

Laura Lee was raised in Berkeley and Marin County in the San Francisco Bay Area. She grew up loving fabrics, art, textures, color and nature.

To date, she has published six books. She teaches quilting classes at shops, guilds, private studios and at international quilt festivals. She has many quilts and wearables for exhibition and sale. Many have been shown in museums and shows across the continent.



Laura Lee spends her day longarm quilting fof clients, tending her fiber producing sheep and the organic gardens they fertilize. She also digitizes her continuous line designs for stitching on a a computerized system.

Her home is in Black Point, outside Novato with her husband Ron Paul, who is a longarm maintenance man. They have a bluetick coonhound.

When, "Oh just stipple it" isn't enough, see how the quilting itself can bring glory to your pieced quilt top. Come and enjoy a PowerPoint journey showing many of the pieces quilted by Laura Lee in the last 24 years.

WORKSHOP FRIDAY, MAY 17, 2013 ~ "ARTFUL HAND APPLIQUE"

In this class, illustrated by the Fuchsia Flowers hand appliqué by Laura, you will learn how to draw a pattern from your favorite flower photograph, how to cut and layer the pattern pieces in cloth, how and why to baste layers together.



You will learn expert needle turn hand appliqué stitching techniques including: how to turn fingertip curves, inside hairpin curves, knife-edge points, square corners, how to detail the appliqué with hand embroidery details that fit the scale.

We will discuss and plan color perspective in relationship to the floral appliqué you will stitch, and your project will get underway, though you will need to complete it on your time out of class.

As the class day progresses we will discuss individual projects to consider quilting concepts to let the background fabric enhance the subject.


decisions, design choices and impact of quilting on finished products.

gether – AND IT NEEDS A BORDER. So you just cut an interesting fabric into larger strips and add it on all sides and it is done!


If this describes your quilt making, you are missing an opportunity to add a little extra to your quilt and create something stunning!

In class, you will learn a method for making a simple block. They will be made in sets of 4; out of 4 lights and 4 dark fabrics. But each fabric will be in a different place in each block. This makes finished results appear very scrappy. These blocks could be used to make a quilt but we will focus on how they can make stunning borders.


Pointless Sisters

Technique Sharing Workshops

Thank you to Jan Head for a very enlightening TSW on April 4, "Skinny Border Accents." This was very well attended and the handout is posted on our web-

The next TSW will be on May 16 when Carolle Le-Monnier demonstrates how to use a pre-printed foundation to make a prairie-point-based placemat or centerpiece. If you didn't order any of the foundations ahead of time, there will be a sign-up sheet at the TSW. Those taking delivery of foundations at the TSW should plan on having the exact change. (Foundations are \$1.25 each, but we may get a quantity discount – we will let you know through our group e-mail.)

On June 6, Linda Hooper will steer us through our annual Mystery Quilt. Only three fabrics are required. The Supply list/cutting instructions are now on our website.

On June 20, Chris Nolen will demonstrate how to make Pet Bed hammocks, and how to assemble the bed frames. The Humane Society is in need of the hammocks (they will make the frames themselves.) These beds are made from home decorator weight fabric or a double layer of quilting cotton fabric, and are fastened with Velcro. Please consider donating fabric and/or Velcro to the project.

We would encourage you all to sign up in advance for the TSWs that interest you, so that we may have enough handouts to go around. We will try to send handouts through the Guild email a couple days ahead of time, so you may print your own and be guaranteed a copy at the TSW!

Friendship Blocks





Vintage Friendship Garden

This quilt was initiated in 1991 as a seed planted by Dorothy Ingham when she requested album blocks be hand appliquéd for her through the Friendship Block program of the Santa Rosa Quilt Guild. She chose designs from a book by Jeana Kimball, RED AND GREEN – AN APPLIQUE TRADITION, published by That Patchwork Place, printed in 1990.

Fellow guild members who created blocks were Katie Alix and Gene Isaacs, now sadly both deceased; Sue Haley and her daughter Sharon Nugent; Jeanette Hensley; Muriel Leary; Lois Stephens; Leslie Roberts; Rita Robinson; Mitzi Dowling, who Dorothy had to convince to participate and helped her learn to appliqué, and now Mitzi still amazes us with her spectacular designs and perfect stitching); and Dorothy Ingham herself who made the center medallion as well as several other blocks.

The blocks were tucked away until April 2012 when Dorothy wrote to Sharon Fry asking if she or the Guild would be interested in inheriting them. Sharon presented the blocks at a Board Meeting where they were met with much admiration and enthusiasm, and the blocks came out of hibernation to be tended and grown into an "Opportunity Quilt" (a.k.a. raffle quilt, which is the annual major fund raiser for the Guild).

Sharon received written permission from the author of the book, as well as the publisher, to use the block designs for the Opportunity Quilt.

Phyllis Gallaway immediately went to work designing the swag borders while Sharon assembled the blocks. Phyllis and Sharon hunted high and low for border fabrics to coordinate with the blocks made from yesteryear and made the purchases at Broadway Quilts in Sonoma. The quilt shop owner, Gery Rosemurgy, very generously donated the precious paisley for the backing.

A full-day work/luncheon party was hostessed by Sharon at Broadway Quilts to prepare the borders. Phyllis shared with the group her special techniques for hand appliqué. Attendees were: Jan Andrews, Rhonda Denny, Joy McGoran, and Jan Westerman.

Kathy Martin, owner of TopStitchers, was hired to do the machine quilting.

Wendy Mouille assisted Sharon with the hand stitching of the binding. At the request of Glenda Ross, Sharon applied three sleeves for display hanging.

(These items don't qualify for the fund raising program.)



Quilting In The Rain

A song and dance kicked off a wonderful luncheon hosted by Santa Rosa Quilt Guild. What a lovely turnout despite a stiff wind and periodic rain. It was perfectly in keeping with the theme. Petaluma Quilt Guild and Moonlight Quilters of Sonoma County packed the house and emcee, Pam McVey, brought the luncheon to order. There were 45 gigantic, overstuffed raffle baskets. There were also two quilts - 'Almost Amish' and 'Sunbonnet Sue' - and a vintage Singer sewing machine up for raffle. A guest speaker, SRQG's own Jan Head, made this girl's eyes tear. A delicious lunch and dessert was served by table hostesses and the tables were decorated in a festive manner that made me proud to belong to such a marvelous group of dedicated persons.

How many quilt guild members does it take to put on a shindig like this? I estimate somewhere between 70 and 100. Seating is limited and there is always a wait list. I have found that the best way to guarantee a seat is to volunteer. I love guest sign-in and feel that greeting is one of my gifts. (They keep letting me, so I am

going with it.) There were three greeting teams, one for each guild. We each had an alphabetized list of first names to check off and adorable hand cut umbrellas with hand sewn pins on the back to serve as name badges - made by Janice R. There were a few umbrellas left over and I am sure they will be seen again on some sweet project in the future. At some point, Betty Upchurch did a quick "drive-by" blessing each of us with precious little scissors in a darling sheath with a beaded detail accompanied by a delicate card of thanks for volunteering.

At 11:00 sharp, I encouraged the greeting teams to enter the grand hall and take a seat so as not to miss out on one jam-packed minute. The table settings were delightful. Each table was adorned with runners of batik and gorgeous fresh flowers from Linda Z's husband's garden. Each place setting had a single rose that was a chocolate kiss wrapped in red tulle and a quilted bookmark with bling. The "cutlery" was swaddled in soft napkins and tied with ribbon-clad buttons. Wine bottles were filled with water and tea and our "glassware" was dressed with fresh lemon slices. I mean, Wow! (That is an understatement.)

I think half of the volunteers were hospitality, lead by Norma V. and Carrolle L. Lunch was amazing. Hot bread in baskets with butter on the side, minestrone soup delicious to the last drop, and a Caesar salad heaped with croutons and parmesan cheese. Our guest speaker, Jan Head, told a tale of pride and circumstance regarding her highly acclaimed (and rightly so) award-winning quilt that took us from inception at a Sally Collins workshop – to Bishops Ranch' - and to near-completion via another Sally Collins workshop at Asilomar. Over time - with encouragement - the guilt was accepted at Houston then on to Paducah.
